Russia Sanctions Amendment Regulations (No 4) 2024

Proposal

This paper seeks authorisation for submission to the Executive Council of the Russia Sanctions Regulations (No 4) 2024 (the Regulations).

Policy

- The Minister of Foreign Affairs is the Responsible Minister under the Russia Sanctions Act 2022 (the Act), and therefore has discretion to decide whether to recommend that sanctions regulations be made under the Act.
- 3 s6(a)
- The regulations will implement sanctions measures under the Russia Sanctions Act 2022, designating individuals and entities providing material and/or strategic support for Russia's illegal invasion of Ukraine.
- The regulations will also prescribe the information to be included in a formal warning under section 20(2)(a) of the Act and the manner in which that warning must be issued by the Attorney-General.

Timing and 28-day rule

6 s6(a), s9(2)(g)(i)

Compliance

- 7 The regulations are in line with the intent and purpose of the Act, and comply with each of the following:
 - 7.1 the principles of the Treaty of Waitangi;
 - 7.2 advice from the Treaty Provisions Officials Group on any Treaty of Waitangi provisions;
 - 7.3 the rights and freedoms contained in the New Zealand Bill of Rights Act 1990 or the Human Rights Act 1993;
 - 7.4 the principles and guidelines set out in the Privacy Act 2020;
 - 7.5 relevant international standards and obligations;

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- 7.6 the Legislation Guidelines (2021 edition), which are maintained by the Legislation Design and Advisory Committee.
- Section 8 of the Act sets out a threshold which the responsible Minister must be satisfied has been met before recommending that an Order in Council be made with regard to sanctions under section 9 of the Act. The Section 8 threshold is that: (i) the regulations are appropriate to respond to threats to the sovereignty or territorial integrity of Ukraine or another country; and (ii) the United Nations Security Council is unlikely to act or has acted insufficiently.
- The Minister is satisfied that the threshold in section 8 has been met for the sanctions measures in the recommended regulations, including with regard to the designation of each individual and entity as identified in Annex 1 of the submission to the Minister of 24 April 2024, entitled *Russia Sanctions Tranche 28*.
- Section 32 of the Act lists additional types of regulations that may be made on the recommendation of the Minister. This includes prescribing the information to be included in a formal warning issued under section 20(2)(a) and the manner in which that warning must be issued.

Regulations Review Committee

There are no grounds for the Regulations Review Committee to draw the regulations to the attention of the House of Representatives under Standing Order 327.

Certification by Parliamentary Counsel

The draft regulations were certified by the Parliamentary Counsel Office (PCO) as being in order for submission to Cabinet.

Impact Analysis

Publicity

The regulations will be publicised through a press release and an update to the New Zealand Sanctions Register (as required by section 14 of the Act). The Ministry will also email information to those who subscribe to its Russia Sanctions Updates service.

Proactive release

This paper will be released proactively with appropriate redactions within 30 business days of the decisions being confirmed by Cabinet. It is expected that the announcement will have been made within this period.

Consultation

The Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Trade has consulted the following agencies in the developing the draft regulations: Parliamentary Counsel Office, Crown Law Office, Customs New Zealand, Department of Internal Affairs, Financial Markets Authority, Immigration New Zealand, New Zealand Police, Ministry of Transport, Reserve Bank, and Ministry for Regulation.

- note that, before recommending that regulations be made under the Act, the responsible Minister must be satisfied that: (i) the regulations are appropriate to respond to threats to the sovereignty or territorial integrity of Ukraine or another country; and (ii) the United Nations Security Council is unlikely to act or has acted insufficiently;
- note that, section 32 of the Act lists additional types of regulations that may be made on the recommendation of the Minister including prescribing the information to be included in a formal warning issued under section 20(2)(a) and the manner in which that warning is to be issued;
- note the advice of the Minister for Foreign Affairs that this requirement has been met;

- note that regulation 4 on the formal warnings will come into force on 17 October 2024, 28-days after gazettal to allow public notice of the change;
