I recommend that Cabinet note this report on my travel to Singapore from 12 – 14 October 2018.

Report

- 1 I travelled to Singapore on 12 14 October 2018 to attend a Ministerial meeting of the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership (RCEP) free trade agreement, on behalf of Hon Damien O'Connor who, at short notice, was unable to travel. In addition to this meeting, I was able to meet bilaterally with my counterparts from Japan, Singapore and India.
- The RCEP negotiations at this meeting formed part of a series of Ministerial meetings scheduled in the second half of 2018. Throughout the meeting Singapore (as the Chair of ASEAN), China and others continued pushing strongly for RCEP to be "substantially concluded" this year. This meeting allowed countries to take stock of progress towards this goal with a focus on market access in goods, services and investment, some rules (on sanitary and phytosanitary (SPS) measures and technical barriers to trade) and a forward work plan towards the next series of Ministerial meetings and the Leaders' Summit on RCEP in the margins of the East Asia Summit.

I was also able

to reiterate the need for countries to provide greater responsiveness to requests in goods negotiations, but also in services and investment market access negotiations. New Zealand was also active in debate on issues relating to the chapters on SPS issues and on standards, technical relations and conformity assessment procedures (technical barriers to trade), **9(2)(j)

The meeting also discussed at length the forward work plan for RCEP for the remainder of 2018. It was decided that Ministers would meet again on 12 November in the margins of the East Asia Summit meetings to make a determination on a range of 'political issues' (discussed at officials' level throughout late October and early November), and pave the way for a possible Summit by RCEP Leaders that same week.
